

CONTRIBUTE: Master Naturalists contribute a minimum of 20 hours of volunteer service annually. Here are some examples of volunteer projects we have been involved with:





Citizen Science: Salt Creek Tiger Beetle habitat monitoring and rearing, surveying for at risk bat species, Regal Fritillary & Monarch Butterfly surveying, Spotted Skunk surveying, Bird counts, Small Mammal surveying and identification, water quality testing.

Resource Management: Prescribe burning, stream clean ups, prairie seed harvesting and planting, invasive species identification and removal. Outdoor Skills: Hunter Education training, support for Family Fishing Programs, Nebraska Game & Park Outdoor Expos, Youth Mentored Hunts, Becoming an Outdoor Woman
